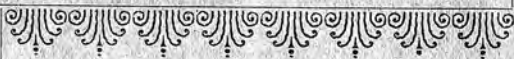

RECAPITULATION.

The foregoing list of vessels includes the names of all the vessels belonging to the District of Gloucester, giving their gross and net tonnage, length, breadth and depth, when and where built, and the names of their principal owners or fitters. The addition of the gross tonnage is made on account of the change in the measurement law, the reduction of five per cent. of the gross tonnage which has been allowed for many years having been taken off and in place thereof the actual space occupied by the cabin and forecastle may be deducted. Although this provision of the law has not yet become general, a considerable number of the fleet have availed themselves of it, and as the reduction generally amounts to from 20 to 30 tons, varying in different vessels, the net tonnage fails to be an approximate guide as to the size of the vessel.

The total number of vessels and boats of every description above 20 tons belonging to the District is 401, aggregating 27,846.61 net tonnage, a decrease of 34 vessels and 2920.63 tons from the preceding year, when the number of vessels was 435, with a net tonnage of 30,767.20 tons. A portion of the tonnage decrease is however imaginary rather than real, being caused by the change in the law referred to above.

The total number of vessels in the list last year was 435, with an aggregate net tonnage of 30,767.24 tons and an average tonnage of 70.73 tons, 342 being schooners, aggregating 27,407.30 tons, 1 three-masted schooner, 447.10 tons, 12 sloops, 817.16 tons, 37 schooner boats, 426.34 tons, 23 sloop boats, 190.79 tons, 11 steamers, 523.39 tons, 5 yachts, 118.20 tons, and 4 barges, 836.96 tons.

The total number of vessels in the list for 1895 was 445, with a total net tonnage of 32,010.37 tons, and an average of 71.95 tons; in 1894 the number was 463, of a total tonnage of 32,628.09 tons and an average of 70.47 tons; in 1893 the number was 483, with an aggregate tonnage of 32,765.20 tons, and an average of 69.92 tons; in 1892 the number was 474, aggregating 32,794.70 tons, and averaging 69.19 tons; and the number in 1891 was 481 vessels, aggregating 32,242.35 tons, and averaging 67.03 tons.

Although the number of vessels has decreased for these years, it will be seen by the above comparisons that the class of vessels has steadily increased, the average tonnage increasing each year except last year, when the loss of a large coasting schooner of over 400 tons caused a slight reduction in the average tonnage.

The total number of new vessels added to the Gloucester fleet the present year was only five, with a total gross tonnage of 419.81 tons, a smaller number than for many years preceding, while the number of vessels added by purchase is also smaller than for many years, there having been only eight additions, with a total tonnage of 362.42 tons.

Last year the number of new vessels was six, aggregating 294.73 tons, and the number of vessels added by purchase was 11, aggregating 857.36 tons.

The additions to the fleet in 1895 was 22, aggregating 1,644.20 tons, of which 9 vessels, 853.29 tons, were built during the year, while in 1894, 29 vessels, 2167.89 tons, were added, of which 24 vessels, 1755.79 tons, were new, and in 1893 the additions were 44 vessels, 2913.03 tons, on which 30 vessels, 2533.84 tons, were built the same year.

Of the new vessels added the present year three were schooners, aggregating 263.90 tons, one a sloop boat of 13.70 tons and one a steam tug, measuring 42.21 tons. Of the number added by purchase, four are schooners, aggregating 323.16 tons, and four are sloop boats, aggregating 39.26 tons.

The losses of both men and vessels in the Gloucester fisheries for the year ending November 1, 1897, is less than for a number of years. The total number of vessels lost is 11, a less number than in any year since 1881, except in 1885, when the number was the same as the present year. The total number of lives lost during the year is 63, the smallest number in any year since 1892, when only 46 lives were lost, and greatly below the average of the past 25 years. The number of lives lost the previous year was 86. As is customary, this number includes deaths at sea from natural causes and drownings in the harbor and at other ports.

Most of the men were unmarried, but five left widows, while the number of fatherless children is 22.

The number of vessels lost the past year was 11, of a total tonnage of 901.54 tons, representing a value of \$75,750 and an insurance of \$52,448, against 14 vessels for the year ending November 1, 1896, when 14 vessels, of an aggregate tonnage of 1091.43, tons, valued at \$71,500 and insured for \$58,486, were lost.

The average loss for the past twenty-five years has been 16 vessels and 101 men, as will be seen by the table of losses on a following page.

The losses the past year have been as follows:

Sch. *PATHFINDER*, 63.90 tons, built at Bath, Me., in 1871, and owned by Wm. Parsons, 2d & Co., went ashore on Green Island, near Portland, Me., November 16, 1896, while engaged in the haddock fishery. Valued, with her outfits, at \$3500 and insured for \$1350 on the vessel and \$1000 on the outfits, by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Co. Crew saved.

Sch. *WILLIE M. STEVENS*, 76.48 tons, built at Bath, Me., in 1887, and owned by William H. Perkins, went ashore at Blanche Point, near Port LaTour, N. S., Dec. 5, while on a haddocking trip, while seeking bait. Valued at \$3800 and insured for \$2109 on the vessel, and \$600 on the outfits, by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company.

Sch. FREDONIA, 109.44 tons, built in Essex, in 1889, owned by William H. Jordan, foundered on the Banks, December 18. Valued at \$10,000 and insured by the China Mutual Insurance Company for \$5500 on the vessel and \$1200 on the outfits. The vessel was boarded by a huge sea, on the 17th, which broke over the quarter and swept clean over the vessel, carrying away hatch- es, boat, sails, boom and rudder, and washing James Haley over- board. Olof Olsen was thrown against the bits and received in- juries from which he died in about six hours. The crew kept the vessel afloat by hard and continuous pumping until the morning of the 18th, when the wreck was sighted by the ocean liner Col- orado, and the rescue of the 21 survivors was accomplished with great difficulty by volunteers from the crew of the steamer, and landed at New York. Haley was about 30 years of age and came to Gloucester from St. John, N. B. Olsen was about the same age and a native of Sweden. Both men were unmarried. The Fredonia was originally built for Commodore Forbes as a yacht, and was one of the fastest sailers of the fleet.

Sch. YOSEMITE, 115.44 tons, built at Essex in 1891, went ashore on Ram island, near Lockeport, N. S., January 21, while on the passage home from Newfoundland with frozen herring. Owned by Capt. John W. McFarland and Fred L. Davis, and valued at \$12,500; insured by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing In- surance Company for \$8,537, \$5,537 being upon the vessel and \$3,000 upon the outfits. Joseph Ferry, the cook, was drowned when the vessel struck, and Philip Fiander had both legs broken and died of his injuries upon the rock before assistance came. The day following the wreck, after the men had remained upon the rock for nearly twenty-four hours, the mate, Patrick Rose, swam through the breakers to the shore, a distance of about 300 yards, with a line, and was thus enabled to save the lives of the rest of the crew.

Sch. MAGGIE AND LILY, 77.72 tons, built at Essex in 1873, foundered on Georges, January 29, 1897, the crew being taken off by Sch. Edith M. McInnis, and landed at Shelburne, N. S. Owned by John Pew & Son, valued at \$6,250 and insured for \$2,848 on the vessel and \$800 on the outfits, by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company.

Sch. LIZZIE J. GREENLEAF, 88.10 tons, built at Essex in 1883, left port December 28, on a fresh halibut trip and never returned. She was last spoken by sch. Alva, January 21, and is supposed to have foundered in the gale of January 28, on Banquereau, going down with all on board. She was owned by Capt. Nathaniel Greenleaf and valued at \$7,500, being insured for \$3,233 on the vessel, and \$1,700 on the outfits, by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company. Her crew list was as follows: Peter Erickson, master, native of Sweden, 38 years of age, leaves widow and one child; William Paris, cook, 44 years of age, native of Deer Isle, Me.; Henry Olsen, 36 years old, native of Norway, leaves widow; Thomas O'Neil, 24, William Mulcaha, 25, and Patrick Fitzpatrick, 27 years, natives of St. John's, N. B.; John Eastlin, 25, and William Wahlstein, 27, natives of Finland; William J. Leary, 28, native of this city; George Lawson, 28, native of Norway; David Hamm, 34, native of Lunenburg, N. S.; Joseph Martin, 38, born in Waterford, Ireland; Robert Bangy, 26, born at Lockeport, N. S.; George Walsh, 20, William Flynn, 28, and John Dee, 19, natives of Placentia Bay, N. F.; William Burgess, 20, born at Heart's Content, Trinity Bay, N. F.; and August Richaud, a native of Paris, France.

Sch. boat BONITA, 17.74 tons, owned by Hodge & Poole, foundered off Gurnet light, Cape Cod, April 9th. Crew saved. Valued at \$1,100 and insured for \$500 on the vessel and \$300 on the outfits, by the China Mutual Insurance Company.

Sch. CHARLES H. TAYLOR, 95.05 tons, built at Essex in 1883, and owned by Davis Brothers, wrecked on Sable island, April 16, while on a fresh halibut trip. Crew saved themselves with great difficulty, five dories being smashed in leaving the vessel. Valued at \$10,000 and insured by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company for \$5,371 on vessel and \$1,800 on the outfits.

Sch. WILLIAM E. McDONALD, 93.46 tons, built in this city in 1875 and owned by James G. Tarr & Bro., went ashore at Great Point, Nantucket, July 31st, while on a seining trip. Crew saved. Valued at \$5,200, and insured for \$2,400 on the vessel and \$1,200 on the outfits, by the Gloucester Mutual Fishing Insurance Company.

Sch. MARATHON, 65 tons, built at Essex, in 1874, sprung aleak and foundered off Cape North, C. B., August 24, while on a North Bay mackerel trip. Crew took to their boats and rowed to land. Owned by Capt. William Hudder, Capt. Solomon Jacobs and Joseph C. Shepherd, and valued at \$5,500. Insured by the China Mutual Insurance Company for \$1,500 on the vessel and \$1,500 on the outfits.

Sch. CORDOVA, 99.21 tons, built in Essex, in 1893, and owned by George Steele & Co., went ashore at Pass island, N. F., September 16, while pursuing the fresh halibut fishery. Crew saved. Valued \$10,400 and insured for \$9,000 in the Boston Marine Insurance Company.

JOSEPH SONIA, a native of Nova Scotia, and ALEX. WHIFFEN, a native of St. Mary's Bay, N. F., went astray from sch. Joseph Rowe, on the Banks, and after rowing to land were drowned while attempting to land at Bacalieu Light, N. F., May 28, 1896.

SAMUEL LOWRY, 35 years old, a native of Canso, N. S., one of the crew of sch. Hattie M. Graham, drowned off Block Island, June 22, by being run down by the vessel while in a seine boat.

WILLIAM D. MUNROE, one of the crew of sch. Lewis H. Giles, drowned on Bacalieu bank, November 3d, by the capsizing of a dory. His companions, John Mason and Albion Lund, were rescued. Munroe was 30 years old, a native of Whitehead, N. S., and left a widow and four children, in this city.

JOHN HENDRICKSEN, 32 years old, unmarried, native of Finland, washed overboard from sch. Elenora, off Thacher's island, December 16th.

JOSEPH BROWN, 33 years of age, widower, leaving one child, killed by a sea on board sch. Grayling, December 15th.

WILLIAM T. HAYDEN, native of Canso, washed overboard from sch. J. W. Collins on La Have bank, December 9th.

DANIEL E. BARROW, washed from the mainboom of sch. Nereid on La Have bank, December 1st.

JOHN WILSON and ALEX. NICKERSON, two of the crew of the sch. Lizzie Griffin, drowned on Banquereau December 26th, by the capsizing of their dory. Wilson was 28 years old, unmarried, and belonged in Portland. Nickerson was 25 years of age, a native of Russia, and single.

THOMAS LANDRY, native of Arichat, C. B., single, 24 years of age, fell overboard from mainboom of sch. Horace B. Parker, on La Have bank, January 10th, 1897.

RICHARD HEARN, 32 years old, native of Spain and unmarried, knocked overboard from sch. Edward A. Perkins, off Eastern Point, January 18th.

AUGUSTUS G. KENCH, native of Prince Edward's Island, washed overboard from sch. Annie C. Hall on Georges, January 11th.

ANDREW JOHNSON, died on board sch. Hustler, January 12th.

WILLIAM MOSHER, native of Liverpool, N. S., washed overboard from sch. Agnes E. Downes, on Grand bank, January 27th.

JAMES OSBORNE, 35 years old, native of Newfoundland, was washed overboard from sch. Hattie Evelyn, on Georges, January 28th.

CAPT. JOHN McDONALD, master of sch. James G. Blaine, and HUGH SKINNER, washed overboard from the schooner, on Georges, January 28th. Capt. McDonald was 30 years of age, a native of Cape Breton, a widower, and left three children. Skinner was also a native of Cape Breton, 22 years old, and unmarried.

RICHARD HOWLETT, 35 years old, native of St. Mary's Bay, N. F., knocked overboard from sch. J. W. Collins, on Georges, January 29th. Left a widow in this city.

ROBERT HAWES, 30 years old, native of Newfoundland, washed overboard from sch. A. M. Burnham, on Brown's bank, January 29th.

CAPT. WILLIAM N. WELLS, master of sch. Helen G. Wells, washed overboard from the schooner on La Have bank, January 29th. He was 48 years of age, a widower, a native of Guysboro, N. S. He left eight children.

HARRY OLSEN and NORMAN JEDDREY, two of the crew of the sch. Edward A. Perkins, drowned on Banquereau, February 10th, by the capsizing of their dory. Olson was 25 years old, and a native of Hammerfest, Norway, and Jeddrey was 25 years old and a native of Yarmouth, N. S.,

CASSIE MUSE, 26 years old, a native of Newfoundland, washed overboard from sch. HATTIE E. WORCESTER, on Grand Bank, February 4th.

JAMES F. CARTER, 22 years old, a native of Boothbay, Me., washed from the bowsprit of sch. Carrier Dove, on Georges; March 7th.

VICTOR ERICKSON, 25 years old, a native of Finland, thrown overboard from sch. Edward Trevoy, on Georges, by lurch of the vessel, March 17th.

ROBERT MUISE and THEODORE BABINE went astray from sch. William E. Morrissey, April 6th. Muise was 25 years of age, a native of Newfoundland, and Babine 30 years of age, a native of Nova Scotia.

JOHN PETIPAW and THOMAS WILLIAMS, two of the crew of the sch. Lizzie Griffin, went astray in their dory, on Grand Bank, April 10th. Petipaw was 30 years of age, a native of Arichat, C. B., and Williams about the same age and a native of Newfoundland.

DANIEL McDONALD, one of the crew of sch. Mattie D. Brundage, of Boston, drowned at Reed & Gamage's wharf, April 16th. He was 24 years of age and a native of Canso, N. S.

JOHN HUEY, 50 years of age, a native of Bristol, Me., died on board sch. Triton, July 8th, on Georges.

EDWARD CARRIGAN, 45 years old, a native of Baine Harbor, Me., died of heart disease, on board of sch. Procyon, on the Banks, July 9th.

JOHN NELSON, and CHARLES RENO, two of the crew of sch. S. P. Willard, went astray from their vessel, on Grand Banks, August 18th, and probably drowned by the capsizing of their dory. Nelson was a native of Norway and Reno was a native of Burnt Island, N. F.

One of the crew of sch. John L. Nicholson, name unknown, drowned by the upsetting of a dory on the Grand Banks, September 11th.

JAMES DOUCETTE and EUGENE BURKE, two of the crew of sch. Bessie M. Devine, drowned on Grand Banks, September 24th, by the capsizing of their dory. Both men were natives of Nova Scotia.

CHARLES SANDBERG, 30 years of age, a native of Sweden, one of the crew of sch. Virginia, died at Bay Bulls, N. F., of brain fever, October 9th.

SIMON MOULISON, one of the crew of sch. Parthia, washed overboard on Grand Bank, October 22d. He was a native of Eelbrook, N. S., and left a widow and five children.

JAMES GARRIGAN, one of the crew of sch. Edith L. Conley, of Provincetown, died from heart disease at the Chelsea Marine Hospital, October 29th, where he was taken with a broken leg. He was 30 years old and a native of Straits of Canso, N. S.

OTHER MARITIME LOSSES.

Paving sloop Alfred A., of Rockport, 72.65 tons, sunk off Marblehead, October 17th, in a gale, and two of the crew, Merrill H. Reed and P. Everett Conley being drowned. The sloop was taking a cargo of paving from Rockport to Boston. Owned by the Rockport Granite Company, valued with the cargo at \$4,000 and uninsured. Reed was a native of Boothbay, 55 years of age, and left a widow and son. Conley was a native of Rockport, 35 years old and single.

Although Gloucester, as the headquarters of the fisheries of New England, suffers the bulk of the losses of life and property in that industry, the other ports which pursue the business to a lesser degree are not exempt from sad if lighter disasters.

The losses of Gloucester for the year ending November 1st have already appeared in these pages, and we record also such disasters to vessels and loss of life from other ports as have come to our notice during the year.

BOSTON.

Sch. Alice Norwood, 45.79 tons, built at Bristol, Me., in 1871, run down by coal steamer and sunk in Boston harbor, December 31. Crew saved.

Thomas Frazier, one of the crew of sch. Edith Emery, died at the Chelsea Marine Hospital, February 3d. He was 45 years of age and lived in Portland.

Alfred Knight and John Hoar, two of the crew of sch. Sylvester Whalen, drowned off Plum island, July 31st, by the upsetting of their dory. Both men were about 30 years of age and unmarried.

Joseph Anthony, a boat fisherman, was run down by sch. Geneva Mertis of this port off Brenton's lightship, September 18th, and drowned. His companion, Michael Haberton, owner and master of the boat, was picked up.

MARBLEHEAD.

Russell H. Broughton, one of the crew of the sch. Flying Cloud, was drowned off Egg Rook, Nahant, January 5th, by the upsetting of his dory.

SWAMPSCOTT.

Sch. Jeannie P. Phillips, 52.85 tons, built in Essex in 1876, wrecked on Harding's ledge, June 13th, her crew of 16 men escaping in the seine boat. The schooner was valued at \$3,000 and owned in small shares by several parties.

PROVINCETOWN.

Archibald Thomas and Lovett Malone, two of the crew of sch. Mertis H. Perry, were drowned January 10th, off Chatham, while trawling for shore haddock, by the capsizing of their dory.

Clifton Eldredge of East Boston and George Nickerson of Cape Islands were capsized in another dory but were rescued by the crew. Thomas was a native of Halifax, 25 years of age, and Malone a native of Woods' Harbor, N. S., and left a widow and six children.

VINALHAVEN.

J. F. Sylvester and his son, lobster fishermen, were drowned April 29th, by the capsizing of their boat.

HARPSWELL.

Sch. Cora E. Smith, 47 tons, built at Bristol, Me., in 1870, was wrecked on Shovelful shoal, near Chatham, July 11th, while on a swordfishing trip. Her crew was taken off by some boat fishermen.

SOLD OR GONE FROM THE DISTRICT.

Twelve schooners, 881.36 tons, two schooner boats, 26.11 tons, five sloop boats, 46.75 tons, and two steam tugs, 28.05 tons, making a total of 21 vessels and 983.22 tons, have been sold or gone from the district the past year, as follows:

Since the preparation of the List was completed, schs. Abbie M. Deering, 96.25 tons, and Concord, 98.56 tons, have also been sold, but as their names are on the preceding List of Vessels, they are not included in the above table.

Sch. Frederic Gerring, Jr., which was seized and condemned by the Dominion government for an alleged violation of the fishing treaty, is also included in the foregoing List of Vessels, her papers never having been surrendered or cancelled at the custom house.

The number of outfitters, including firms and individual owners, at Gloucester Harbor, October 20, 1897, was 38, fitting out 267 vessels. This list does not, however, include a large number of owners who sail their own vessels, and have no permanent place of fitting, while several vessels are included which are owned by their masters, but fit regularly at the places under which they are given.
